Lease Developments

The Finchley Horticultural Society has not yet been able to finalise and sign new leases for its Gordon Road and Nethercourt Avenue allotment sites. We expect to do so shortly as there is now only one outstanding issue to resolve: the precise boundary of our land along the Dollis Brook. The lease will be backdated to 1st October 2012. The Council have still not sorted out their legal landholding position for the Brent Way site, but we will be taking over management here from 1st April.

Because the new leases contain conditions and restrictions which are changes to our current agreement with the Council, we will be issuing a new plotters Tenancy Agreement and Handbook.

Our sites have been inspected and their condition at handover noted. Where there is existing Council management responsibility and outstanding health and safety concerns, the Council have agreed to carry out works to make safe within two years of the lease start date. At Gordon Road dead trees will be felled along the Dollis Road boundary, five leaning and cracked fence posts along Gordon Road will be replaced and concrete by the main entrance removed. No works will be undertaken at Nethercourt, and Brent Way has yet to be inspected. More information at the AGM – plus what additional changes will be in the Tenancy Agreement.

Growing Pains

Slugs

With all the wet weather, slugs have had perfect conditions. B&Q reported a 74% increase in sales of slug pellets last year. We have now heard of a big alien slug, known as the Spanish Stealth Slug (*Arion flagellu*), whose numbers are increasing. It is a sickly olive-green colour, grows to more than 10cm (4ins) and has a rampant breeding cycle that produces hundreds more eggs than the typical British slug. It is getting a foothold in the UK and spreading. Be alert to this invader and let us know if you find any at our allotment sites.



Spanish Stealth Slugs

British slugs each produce about 50-100 offspring which is more than enough to decimate our crops. It is important to control the population from early spring and this year, having enjoyed the high rainfall, numbers are likely to be very high.

There are an enormous number of recommended methods for getting rid of slugs and snails. Some, such as liquid coffee or vinegar might affect the taste of your crops. Others such as keeping chickens, a regular night patrol to pick them off your plants, or traps which need checking every day are not practical for most ploholders. Some methods are disgusting such as stamping on them, putting them in boiling water or killing with salt – but the brave might try these for limited control. Nematodes, sold under the name of ‘Nemaslug’, can be effective for up to 6 weeks but find clay soil difficult to move in and cost about £8.95 to treat 40 sq metres. Natural predators such as frogs, hedgehogs, slowworms and thrushes are a great help and should be encouraged. Slug pellets work, but should be used sparingly. Please use organic pellets (Gardening Which? tests show they are just as effective as chemical ones and pose no threat to people, pets or wildlife). The Trading Hut at Gordon Road will have plenty in stock for you when it opens at the end of March.

Ash Dieback Disease

This disease is threatening the UK's 80 million ash tree population.

Infected trees usually die. There are ash trees around the boundaries of our allotments and it will be very sad to lose any of them. So far, there have been no reports of the disease in Barnet – but it is only a matter of time. Ash dieback is caused by a fungus *Chalara fraxinea*. It causes leaf loss, lesions on the bark and dieback of the crown. The disease is spread by spores from the fruiting bodies of the fungus on dead leaves. The spores are carried on the wind to infect more ash trees. Further information can be found at The Woodland Trust (www.woodlandtrust.org.uk/treedisease). Pigeons

Pigeons are a pest which destroy our crops, particularly during the winter and early spring. They seem to be increasing in numbers and attacking anything green when food is scarce.

Found throughout UK the feral (town) pigeon is descended from the wild Rock Dove and racing pigeons. Unfortunately, they nest all year round usually laying two white eggs which hatch 18 days later. The young leave the nest about 4-5 weeks after hatching. Feral pigeons often nest in or around buildings - under eaves, bridges or anywhere else at all where there is shelter.

Some folk swear pigeon control works by intimidation through models of predators. Success stories include wooden cat and fox heads with large eyes and teeth in vivid colours, artificial owls, and life-size plastic herons. Some reports say these only work for a limited time. Others claim shiny CD discs on string waving in the breeze are effective. All might be worth a try. But netting or covering with mesh is really the only way to give your crops long term protection.
